

Inspiring stories launch Federation campaign

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There was a time when Noah Farrell's future didn't look very bright. His parents, both drug and alcohol addicts, divorced when he was a child, and both died by the time he was 14. He lost interest in school and sports and became, in his words, "a sketchy kid."

But the Jewish community rallied around him, and he is grateful to the Jewish Federation of Cleveland and some schools and agencies supported by the Federation for helping to make that happen.

"If you focus on the good things in life and be optimistic, things will come your way," Farrell said at the launch event for the Federation's 2017 Campaign for Jewish Needs Aug. 30 at Park Synagogue East in Pepper Pike. "Good things don't happen when you're down all the time, and it took me a while to realize that.

"Everyone could use the help of the Jewish organizations that helped me. These organizations changed my life."

Farrell, of University Heights, received a standing ovation from the crowd of nearly 400 when he finished his 10-minute talk. A June graduate of Fuchs

In addition to this year's class, the CJN is pleased to announce a Civic Leadership Award, which will be presented to David Gilbert of Solon. In addition to his two full-time leadership roles as President and CEO of both Destination Cleveland and the Greater Cleveland Sports Com-

> mission. Gilbert took on an additional position as the chairman of the RNC Host Committee for this summer's Republican National Convention in Cleveland. Under his leadership, the city received much praise, admiration and accolades from around the world. thus impacting the greater community in which we all live.

Additionally, the CJN has created a new Generation Award, an annual

award that recognizes a family that has instilled the values of tikkun olam - a tenet of Judaism – across generations. The inaugural Generation Award will be presented to the Berns family of Hunting Valley.

"In honoring David Gilbert with this Civic Leadership Award, we felt there is no more appropriate time than now to pay tribute to his leadership and community impact we all experienced this summer," Adelstein said. "In presenting members of the Berns family with our new Generation Award, we hope to emphasize how crucial l'dor va'dor (from generation to genera-



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tion) really is. They truly epitomize setting and carrying out the example of tikkun olam from one generation to another."

The event will be held at 6 p.m. Nov. 2 at Landerhaven in Mayfield Heights. Kosher dietary laws will be observed. Tickets for the event are \$72 each and can be purchased at cjn.org/differencemakers.

The award winners will be featured in a special pull-out commemorative section in the Oct. 28 issue of the CJN and as well as on cin.org.

The criteria for Difference Makers were as follows: They had to be at least 18 years old by July 30, 2016, and have

ties to Northeast Ohio; they should be making a difference in Northeast Ohio's Jewish community by being active through a nonprofit organization, volunteer group or professional endeavor; and they must demonstrate the "mensch-like" characteristics of honor and integrity.

Difference Makers do not have to be Jewish, but their efforts must help better the Northeast Ohio Jewish community.
